**THE HISTORY AND FUTURE OF THE CIA**

with Tim Weiner, Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist and author



For the last sixty years, the CIA has managed to maintain a formidable reputation in spite of its record of burying its blunders in top-secret archives. Its failures have handed us, in the words of President Eisenhower, 'a legacy of ashes.' Tim Weiner's book, *Legacy of Ashes: The History of the CIA*, is based on more than 50,000 documents, primarily from the archives of the CIA, and hundreds of

interviews with CIA veterans, including ten directors of central intelligence. He explores the agency's creation after World War II, through its near collapse after September 11, 2001. Why has the CIA made so many serious errors that have profoundly jeopardized our national security? How can this be remedied and what ought to be the CIA's role in the future?

Tim Weiner, a reporter for the *New York Times*, has specialized in national security for about twenty-five years. He has been a foreign correspondent in Afghanistan, Chad, Cuba, Kenya, Liberia, Mexico, Pakistan, the Philippines, and Sudan for the *Times* and the *Philadelphia Inquirer*. He won the 1988 Pulitzer Prize for reporting on national-security issues and shared the 1982 Pulitzer while at the *Kansas City Times*. *Legacy of Ashes: The History of the CIA* won the 2007 National Book Award for nonfiction and was a bestseller. **THE KABUL BEAUTY SCHOOL**

with Deborah Rodriguez, author and hairdresser



Deborah Rodriguez is a hairdresser who jumped from Holland, Michigan, to Kabul, Afghanistan. During a disaster-relief tour arranged by a humanitarian group, she wondered what she might have to offer people who had weathered five long years of Taliban control, which fell with the launch of Operation Enduring Freedom in October 2001. As it turned out, the Taliban had closed the city's hair salons and the

demand for haircuts was huge. Eventually Deborah Rodriguez ran both a salon and a nonprofit beauty school in Kabul that helped hundreds of women learn life-sustaining skills and gain economic independence. With beauty school skills, many women have been able to increase their income ten to twenty times, and because men are not allowed to see uncovered women in Afghan society, this is the one and only industry in the country that women can own and operate without male influence.

Deborah Rodriguez spent five years teaching and later directing the Kabul Beauty School, the first modern beauty academy and training salon in Afghanistan. She also owned the Oasis Salon and the Kabul Coffee House. Rodriguez had to flee Kabul in May 2007 and now lives in Northern California. Her book, *Kabul Beauty School: An American Woman Goes Behind the Veil*, coauthored with Kristin Ohlson, is a *New York Times* bestseller and has been optioned by Columbia Pictures. **OUT OF MAO'S SHADOW: STORIES FROM THE STRUGGLE FOR CHINA'S SOUL**with Philip Pan, former *Washington Post* Beijing bureau chief

While some observers assume that Chinese democracy will develop naturally as its economy expands, others stress that there is nothing automatic about political change in China. Philip Pan claims that whatever change may occur will depend on certain courageous individuals in China, who are challenging established norms and blazing new paths for China's emergence on the world stage. He poses intriguing questions: Is the Internet enabling Chinese people in 2008, just as fax machines did for Tiananmen Square protestors in 1989? Could democratic change be catalyzed by China's youth?

Philip Pan is a graduate of Harvard University and spent a year studying Mandarin Chinese at Beijing University. Starting as a summer intern in 1995 at the *Washington Post*, he became Beijing correspondent in 2000 and bureau chief in 2003. Pan won the Livingston Award for Young Journalists in the international reporting category, the Overseas Press Club's Bob Considine Award for best newspaper interpretation of international affairs, and the Asia Society's Osborne Elliott Prize for Excellence in Asian Journalism. ## HOPE AND FEAR: AMERICAN AND CHINESE ATTITUDES TOWARD EACH OTHER

with Frank H. Wu, former dean, Wayne State University Law School, and cochair, 2007 Committee of 100 Parallel Survey



With the 2008 Beijing Olympics looming and all eyes on China as the next potential superpower, what do American and Chinese people really think about each other? Many have analyzed the thoughts of each country's top leadership, but what are American and Chinese attitudes as a whole? The Committee of 100, a national nonpartisan, nonprofit organization of Chinese American leaders, published its

public opinion survey, *Hope & Fear: American and Chinese Attitudes Toward Each Other*, in late 2007. Conducted from August 18 to September 19, 2007, in the United States and China, the survey covers a range of bilateral issues, including economics and trade, product safety, Taiwan, the environment, mood of the country, and foreign policy. Frank H. Wu, cochair of the 2007 study, will address the significance of the survey's findings.

Frank H. Wu will be a visiting professor at the University of Maryland and George Washington University for the 2008–09 academic year. He previously served as dean of Wayne State University Law School from 2004 until May of this year. He is the author of *Yellow: Race in America Beyond Black and White* and coauthor of *Race, Rights and Reparation: Law and the Japanese American Internment*. ## THE HIGHEST STAKES: U.S. MIDDLE EAST POLICY AND THE 2008 ELECTIONS

with James J. Zogby, president, Arab American Institute



America's Middle East policy is being scrutinized heavily during this election season; getting it right has never been more important. James Zogby maintains that the risks in the region are exceedingly high, the challenges as great as ever, and the stakes are reaching new heights. Many questions abound: Do we "stay the course" in Iraq, for example, or do we change direction and find a different way forward?

If the latter option is to be pursued, Zogby claims, it will only come about because an informed public demands it of U.S. leadership. In assessing the way forward in the Middle East, Zogby explores the responsibility of the American public in helping shape U.S. policy in the Middle East.

James J. Zogby is founder and president of the Arab American Institute, a Washington, D.C.-based organization that serves as the political and policy research arm of the Arab American community. He has been involved in a full range of Arab American issues for more than three decades. He cofounded the Palestine Human Rights Commission in the 1970s, then the American-Arab Anti-Discrimination Committee, and, later, Save Lebanon, Inc. In 1993, Vice President Al Gore asked him to lead Builders for Peace, a private sector committee to promote U.S. business investment in the West Bank and Gaza. **HOW THE OLYMPICS CHANGED THE WORLD**

with David Maraniss, Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist and author



Using the Rome 1960 Olympics as the backdrop, David Maraniss will discuss how those Games changed the world, and how politics, history, and sports combine in the Olympics. Chicago was involved then, with Chicagoan Avery Brundage serving as the president of the International Olympic Committee, and is involved again now as the U.S. bid city for the 2016 Olympics. In 1960, the Rome Olympics featured Rafer Johnson, Wilma Rudolph, and Cassius Clay. Rome also witnessed the first doping scandal, the first commercially televised summer games, and the first athlete paid for wearing a particular brand of shoes. The Cold War was at its height, but East and West Germany competed as a unified team less than a year before the Berlin Wall went up. There was a heated dispute over the two Chinas, and the People's Republic of China did not compete, protesting the inclusion of Taiwan. What can we learn from Olympic history, and what do the 2008 Beijing Games hold in store?

David Maraniss is an associate editor at the *Washington Post* and a three-time Pulitzer Prize finalist. He won the Pulitzer in 1993 for national reporting for coverage of then-presidential candidate Bill Clinton. He was also part of the *Post's* team that recently won a 2008 Pulitzer for the coverage of the Virginia Tech shooting.
