with Jan Egeland, former UN Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs and Emergency Relief Coordinator



Traveling to the frontlines of conflicts and bringing the world's attention to the suffering in places like Darfur, Sudan, Colombia, Lebanon, and the Palestinian Territories, Jan Egeland has dealt with the best and the worst of humanity on journeys to some of the world's most dangerous places. In his capacity as UN under-secretary-general for humanitarian affairs, Egeland met with guerrilla leaders,

warlords, heads of state, and besieged aid workers throughout the globe. He has been called "the world's conscience" and "one of the 100 people who shape our world" by *Time* magazine.

Jan Egeland was under-secretary-general of the United Nations and emergency relief coordinator from August 2003 to December 2006. He led the joint efforts in providing relief in the wake of a number of disasters, including the earthquake in Bam, the Indian Ocean earthquakes and tsunami, the drought in West Africa, and the 2005 Atlantic hurricane seasons. He coinitiated and coorganized the Norwegian channel between Israel and the PLO in 1992, which led to the Oslo Accord of September 1993. He has served as secretary general of the Norwegian Red Cross, state secretary in the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and is currently director of the Norwegian Institute of International Affairs. with Jeffrey Sachs, director, the Earth Institute, Columbia University



Does the current global economic system face a sustainability crisis? Jeffrey Sachs, special advisor to UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon on the Millennium Development Goals, thinks it does. He argues for a new economic paradigm – global, inclusive, cooperative, environmentally aware, and science-based – to confront the realities of a crowded and rapidly integrating planet. Exploring the likelihood of a

worldwide economic collapse of unprecedented severity, he poses the provocative question: how long before the world must face the consequences of globalization?

Jeffrey Sachs is the director of The Earth Institute, Quetelet Professor of Sustainable Development, and Professor of Health Policy and Management at Columbia University. From 2002 to 2006, Jeffrey Sachs was director of the UN Millennium Project and special advisor to United Nations Secretary-General Kofi Annan on the Millennium Development Goals, the internationally agreed goals to reduce extreme poverty, disease, and hunger by the year 2015. HIGH EXPECTATIONS: ARE WE WINNING THE WAR ON DRUGS?

with Ethan Nadelmann, founder and executive director, Drug Policy Alliance

The War on Drugs has been marching on since well before Richard Nixon coined the phrase in 1971, and it continues to be a battle – and a debate – for governments and policymakers around the world. The complexities surrounding the prohibition of drugs include a mixture of economic, health and wellness, and social and human rights issues. The argument is further fueled by morality, religion, race, law enforcement, and money. What has the War on Drugs accomplished in the thirty-seven years after Nixon's declaration? Are there alternatives to the current drug laws and policies? Is this a war that has an end?

Ethan Nadelmann is the founder and executive director of the Drug Policy Alliance, the leading organization in the United States promoting alternatives to the war on drugs. Described by *Rolling Stone* as “the point man” for drug policy reform efforts, he is widely regarded as the most prominent proponent of drug policy reform. Nadelmann authored the book, *Cops Across Borders*, the first scholarly study of the internationalization of U.S. criminal law enforcement. His new book, coauthored with

Peter Andreas and entitled *Policing the Globe: Criminalization and Crime Control in International Relations*, explains how and why prohibitions and policing practices increasingly extend across borders.

MARCHING TOWARD HELL:
AMERICA AND ISLAM AFTER IRAQ

with Michael Scheuer, veteran CIA counterterrorism analyst



A CIA veteran, a one-time head of the agency's Osama bin Laden unit, and the first chief of the U.S. government's rendition program, Michael Scheuer has been questioning the U.S. government's approach to the war on terror. In his new book, he argues that America is still unsafe from terrorists, not only because of the war in Iraq but also because of U.S. foreign policy since the end of the Cold War. For the last twenty years, American policymakers – on both sides of the aisle – have remained stuck in “Cold War thinking,” and as a result, have failed adequately to address national security concerns, leaving our nation increasingly vulnerable to attack. He argues that one of the greatest challenges that Americans face is that we still do not fully understand why Osama bin Laden declared war on the United States in 1994.

Scheuer is the author of the *New York Times* bestseller *Imperial Hubris: Why the West is Losing the War on Terror*. His first book, *Through Our Enemies' Eyes: Osama bin Laden, Radical Islam, and the Future of America*, and *Imperial Hubris* were both published anonymously. Edward Price Bell invented the job of foreign correspondent when he opened the London bureau of the *Chicago Daily News* in 1900. His autobiography, describing the birth of the profession of foreign correspondents, illuminates how dedicated, hard-working people have been braving all odds to connect Chicago to the world for over a century. Bell's story, however, lay unpublished in the Newberry Library until John Maxwell Hamilton edited and published it as part of a series of memoirs and books by pioneering foreign correspondents. Richard C. Longworth, prize-winning *Chicago Tribune* foreign correspondent for twenty years, will join Professor Hamilton for a conversation about how the role of the foreign correspondent has changed and about Chicago's unique place in global media.

With the collapse of the Soviet Union, the fall of the Berlin Wall, and the deregulation of international financial markets in 1989, governments and entrepreneurs alike became intoxicated by forecasts of limitless expansion into newly opened markets. No one would foresee that the greatest success story to arise from these events would be the globalization of organized crime; current estimates suggest that illegal trade

accounts for nearly one-fifth of global GDP.

Misha Glenny has spent the last ten years investigating the world of global organized crime and has developed extensive contacts not only among law-enforcement officials but also in the gray zone where the criminal and legal authorities intersect and even exchange roles. A resident of London, Glenny is the author of *The Rebirth of History*, *The Fall of Yugoslavia*, and *The Balkans, 1804–1999*. China's exceptional growth owes much to free trade and the stable international economic system. However, as it continues its rise in power and influence, to what extent are China's policies and actions those of a responsible member of the international community, or those of an individual nation intent on its own economic agenda?

Kenneth Lieberthal also is a nonresident senior fellow in foreign policy studies at The Brookings Institution. He served from 1998 to 2000 as special assistant to the president for National Security Affairs and senior director for Asia on the National Security Council. Currently, he sits on the board of directors of the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations and the executive board of The U.S.-China Policy Foundation.

David Michael Lampton also is a former president of the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations and a past director of China Policy Studies at the American Enterprise Institute, as well as a current trustee of The Asia Foundation. He also sits on the board of directors of the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations and the executive board of The U.S.-China Policy Foundation.
