with General Michael V. Hayden, USAF, director,  
Central Intelligence Agency



General Michael V. Hayden, who became the 18th director of the Central Intelligence Agency in May 2006, will discuss today's CIA and the current and future intelligence challenges facing the nation. As CIA director, Hayden leads the agency and manages the intelligence community's HUMINT and open source collection programs on behalf of the director of National Intelligence.

General Hayden previously was the first principal deputy director of National Intelligence. With that appointment in April 2005, he received his fourth star, making him the highest-ranking intelligence officer in the armed forces. He has wide experience in leadership positions throughout the intelligence community. He served as director of the National Security Agency and chief of the Central Security Service at Fort George G. Meade in Maryland. General Hayden also was commander of the Air Intelligence Agency and director of the Joint Command and Control Warfare Center, both headquartered at Kelly Air Force Base, Texas. He also served as director of Intelligence Directorate for the U.S. European Command in Stuttgart, Germany.

General Hayden also has held senior staff positions at the Pentagon, the National Security Council, and the U.S. Embassy in Sofia, Bulgaria, as well as serving as deputy chief of staff for UN Command and U.S. Forces in Korea. *Learn more and register online at [thechicagocouncil.org](http://thechicagocouncil.org).*

#### OLD TIES, NEW CRISES: THE STRATEGIC RATIONALE FOR THE U.S.-SAUDI RELATIONSHIP

with Rachel Bronson, Ph.D., vice president for programs  
and studies, The Chicago Council on Global Affairs



In 1945, the United States and Saudi Arabia began a relationship forged between two leaders, President Franklin D. Roosevelt and then Saudi ruler, King Abdel Aziz. Never free of dissension, this relationship has weathered storms of embargoes, restrictions to arms sales, and tension surrounding political issues in the region. Why, then, is the United States so hard-pressed to give up the House of Saud? Rachel Bronson's book, *Thicker*

*Than Oil: America's Uneasy Partnership with Saudi Arabia*, pointedly deflects the oversimplified assumption that the mutual affection has only to do with oil. Dr. Bronson illuminates the discussion about one of the world's most misunderstood partnerships and explains what the ties that bind truly are.

Dr. Bronson's writings have appeared in publications such as *Foreign Policy*, *Foreign Affairs*, the *National Interest*, *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post*, and the *Chicago Tribune*. She has commented widely on foreign affairs in outlets such as NPR, CNN, *The Lehrer News Hour*, *The Charlie Rose Show*, and *The Daily Show with Jon Stewart*. She earned a B.A. in history at the University of Pennsylvania and an M.A. and Ph.D. in political science from Columbia University. Prior to joining The Chicago Council on Global Affairs, Bronson served as senior fellow and director of Middle East studies at the Council on Foreign Relations in New York. **THE CONSCIENCE OF A LIBERAL**with Paul Krugman, economist and *New York Times* columnist

The growing divide between the haves and have-nots has become an issue of increasing concern in the United States. With the flight of industry to labor markets overseas, rising education and health care costs, and record levels of housing foreclosures, many have been left to wonder: what happened to the American middle class? Renowned commentator and economist Paul Krugman takes up this question in his latest book, *The Conscience*

*of a Liberal*. He examines eight decades of American history in an effort to explain the socioeconomic and political iniquities that permeate American society. Krugman searches for a way to reclaim the values that once made the comforts of a middle class existence not just an American dream, but an American reality.

Krugman is a professor of economics and international affairs at Princeton University, a columnist for *The New York Times* and *Slate* magazine, and author or editor of twenty books and numerous scholarly articles. Krugman served for a year, during the Reagan administration, as a member of the Council of Economic Advisers. His accolades include the prestigious John Bates Clark Medal, a biennial award given by the American Economic Association to an economist under forty. **ADLAI STEVENSON'S LASTING LEGACY**

a panel discussion

Adlai E. Stevenson II (1900-1965), who was president of The Chicago Council from 1935-1937, remains one of the most enduring political figures of our time. Throughout his extraordinary career at the heights of American politics and foreign policy – as a two-time Democratic presidential nominee, a founder of the United Nations, U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, and governor of Illinois – he has been acclaimed as one of the world's great statesmen. He displayed a passion for a sensitive U.S. foreign policy in the nuclear era, emphasizing international institutions like the United Nations, consensus-building and diplomacy, not unilateral action. He made pursuit of an international ban of above-ground nuclear testing a key issue in his 1956 presidential campaign, providing early stimulus for the Nuclear Test Ban Treaty. His legacy is vital today, ahead of the 2008 election, as the world continues to confront the threat of nuclear weapons and as U.S. power and diplomacy are tested by the Iraq war, the threat of terrorism, and the dynamics of globalization and geopolitics. Stevenson's belief that America must lead by example to foster democracy, security, and peace – as timely now as during his historic period of public service – continues to inspire.

This unique panel discussion featuring family and former colleagues of Adlai Stevenson will explore Stevenson's legacy in light of current global events. The panel includes **The Honorable Adlai Stevenson III**, former U.S. senator and Stevenson's eldest son; **Adele Simmons**, Chicago Metropolitan 2020 vice chair and Stevenson's goddaughter; Ambassador James Goodby, former U.S. ambassador to Finland; and longtime Stevenson associate

### AN IRAQI WOMAN'S ACCOUNT OF WAR AND RESISTANCE: FROM SADDAM TO TODAY

with Iraqi journalist Haifa Zangana



War has left Baghdad as a "city of widows," where more than three hundred thousand women have been left to head households. As economic sanctions disproportionately affect women and children, war and occupation have destroyed their ways of life. Haifa Zangana, an Iraqi journalist and former political prisoner of the Ba'ath Regime, shrugs off stereotypes about women's roles in Iraq and the Arab world, highlighting instead a long line of

daring activists who have controversially resisted aggression and despotism for the past hundred years – from a handful of turn-of-the-century poets, to 1960s activists in armed struggle, to suicide bombers today. Her views on the current situation in Iraq are both troubling and thought-provoking, both for what they say about the current crisis as well as for what they say about the myriad ways people respond to extreme adversity.

Zangana lives in exile in London and writes regularly for the *Guardian*, *al-Quds*, *Red Pepper*, and *al-Ahram Weekly*. She has worked as an adviser for the UN Development Program, writing a report on empowerment of women in the Arab world, and as a member of the advisory board of a Brussels tribunal on Iraq. ### SUPERCAPITALISM

with Robert Reich, former U.S. secretary of labor, and professor of public policy, Goldman School of Public Policy, University of California, Berkeley



Mid-twentieth-century capitalism has turned into global capitalism, and global capitalism—turbocharged, Web-based, and able to find and make almost anything just about anywhere—has turned into super capitalism. But as Robert Reich makes clear in his eye-opening book, *Supercapitalism: The Transformation of Business, Democracy, and Everyday Life*, while capitalism is working wonderfully well

to enlarge the economic pie, democracy is becoming less and less effective under its influence. Reich, whose weekly commentaries on NPR's *Marketplace* are heard by more than five million people, sets a clear course to a vibrant capitalism and a concurrent, equally vibrant democracy.

Reich, currently professor of public policy at the Goldman School of Public Policy at the University of California, Berkeley, was secretary of labor in the Clinton administration. In 2003, he was awarded the prestigious Václav Havel Foundation Prize for his pioneering work in economic and social thought. He also has worked as a faculty member at Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government, director of the policy planning staff of the Federal Trade Commission under President Carter, assistant to the solicitor general under President Ford, and former chairman of the political magazine the *American Prospect*, which he cofounded. He also was one of the original founders of the Economic Policy Institute in 1986. Reich is a graduate of Dartmouth College, and after winning a Rhodes scholarship, earned an M.A. from University College, Oxford. He later attended Yale Law School. **WHAT'S SO FUNNY 'BOUT PEACE, LOVE, AND TRANSPARENCY?**

with Dan Lindley, assistant professor of political science, and fellow at the Joan B. Kroc Institute for International Peace Studies, University of Notre Dame



As UN peacekeeping missions around the world work to contain crises, many questions arise about ways to increase their effectiveness. Examining security regimes and exploring the mechanisms available to promote peace, Dan Lindley proposes that increased transparency can play a powerful role if applied properly. What do examples like UN operations in Cyprus, the Golan Heights, Namibia, and Cambodia, as well as the

Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, demonstrate about the role of information-sharing in security regimes? Does transparency work, and how?

Lindley is an assistant professor in the department of political science at the University of Notre Dame, where he is also a fellow at the Joan B. Kroc Institute for International Peace Studies. Lindley received his B.A. in international relations and French from Tufts University. Before attending graduate school in the Security Studies Program at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), he worked for Congressman Ratchford, the Center for Defense Information, the Federation of American Scientists, and The Brookings Institution. Lindley also lectured at MIT and was a fellow in the International Security Program at the Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs at Harvard University. **A MOVING TARGET: THE EVOLVING THREAT OF NUCLEAR PROLIFERATION**

with Robert L. Gallucci, dean, Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service, Georgetown University

Robert L. Gallucci will discuss ways in which the threat posed by the worldwide spread of nuclear weapons has changed in recent years. Exploring the connection between nuclear energy and nuclear weapons, as well as the specific cases of North Korea and Iran, Gallucci will assess the risk of nuclear terrorism and discuss the implications of nuclear technology - whether for energy or for weapons - for national security in the 21st century.

Gallucci is the dean of Georgetown University's Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service. He spent twenty-one years in government service, including serving with the U.S. Department of State as ambassador at large and as the assistant secretary of state for political-military affairs. He has authored a number of publications on political-military issues, including *Going Critical: The First North Korean Nuclear Crisis*, with Joel S. Wit and Daniel Poneman. In this first part of the 2007-2008 *Chicago and the World Forum* series, noted historian Niall Ferguson will discuss the devastating factors that led to 20th century violence and consider whether such violence is avoidable in the future. With a focus on imperial decline, economic volatility, and ethnic conflict, Ferguson will identify key challenges confronting today's leaders. How long can U.S. leaders navigate the violent tides of history,

which historical analogies are relevant, and what strategies and policies should be pursued to avoid the mistakes of the past?

Ferguson is the Laurence A. Tisch Professor of History at Harvard University and William Ziegler Professor of Business Administration at Harvard Business School. He is also a senior research fellow at Jesus College, Oxford University, and a senior fellow at the Hoover Institution, Stanford University. A prolific commentator on contemporary politics and economics, Ferguson writes and reviews regularly for the British and American press. He is a weekly columnist for the *Los Angeles Times*, and in 2004 *Time* magazine named him one of the world's one hundred most influential people. In 2008, PBS will screen a television adaptation of his latest book, *The War of the World: Twentieth-Century Conflict and the Descent of the West*, which will be available for purchase and signing at the program. In part two of the 2007-2008 Chicago and the World Forum series, leading political thinker Walter Russell Mead will discuss grand strategy and America's role in the world. He will give special emphasis to the liberal order created by Anglo-American leaders that has been unusually tolerant, unusually open to new ideas, and unusually pious. Current conflicts, he argues, are not a clash of civilizations, but part of a long-term struggle between

liberal states and their illiberal foes. Mead will outline the various strategies available to American leaders in 2008 and beyond.

Walter Russell Mead is the Henry A. Kissinger Senior Fellow for U.S. Foreign Policy at the Council on Foreign Relations in New York. Mead, who received his B.A. from Yale University, is an expert on U.S. foreign policy, international political economy, religion, and foreign policy. He is the author of *Power, Terror, Peace, and War: America's Grand Strategy in a World at Risk*, among other books, and has written for *Esquire*, *The New York Times*, *International Herald Tribune*, *Wall Street Journal*, and *The New Yorker*. ## POWER AND PERSUASION: ENSURING U.S. LEADERSHIP IN THE GLOBAL ERA

with Ambassador Thomas R. Pickering, former U.S. ambassador to the United Nations



In part three of the 2007-2008 *Chicago and the World Forum* series, distinguished policy practitioner Ambassador Thomas R. Pickering will discuss ways to ensure U.S. leadership in the global era, addressing the particular challenges that will confront the next U.S. administration. Drawing on his long and distinguished career shaping U.S. foreign policy, Ambassador Pickering will examine the principles that should guide American foreign policy, the country's

key objectives in its relations with the rest of the world, and the means and strategies the United States can employ to achieve those objectives. How can the United States maintain its global leadership, what policy challenges will confront it, and what roles do diplomacy, economic strength, and military might play in advancing the national interest?

In a diplomatic career spanning five decades, Ambassador Pickering served as U.S. ambassador to the Russian Federation, India, Israel, El Salvador, Nigeria, and Jordan, and from 1989 to 1992, he served as U.S. ambassador and representative to the United Nations. From 1997 to 2001, he served as U.S. under secretary of state for political affairs. He also served as executive secretary of the Department of State and as special assistant to secretaries William P. Rogers and Henry A. Kissinger. Ambassador Pickering recently retired as senior vice president of International Relations at The Boeing Company and now serves as vice chairman of Hills and Company.
