Several democratic elections have taken place in Latin America in the past year – for example in Mexico, Chile, and Bolivia. However, democracies in this region will remain unstable if the major challenges of growth, poverty, inequality, integration, crime, and governance are not addressed. The main challenges in Latin America today are not ideological, but rather relate to governments' abilities

to demonstrate the benefits of democracy to skeptical populations. José Miguel Insulza was elected secretary general of the Organization of American States in May 2005. Following a distinguished career in academia, he served as Chile's minister of foreign relations, secretary of the presidency, and most recently minister of the interior and vice-president of the republic. *Learn more and register online at thechicagocouncil.org.*

Many also believe that as a nation we are engaged in what amounts to 'democracy on steroids' and that we should

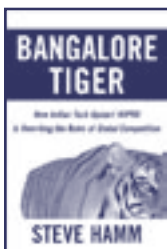

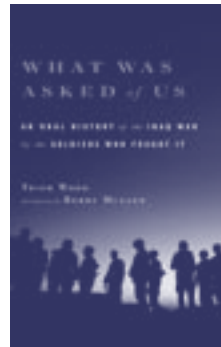

About one million young Americans have rotated through Iraq since the start of the war in March 2003. Trish Wood, an award-winning investigative reporter who has been working with veterans of the Iraq war for more than two years, will moderate a discussion with Army Captain Jonathan Powers and former Army sniper Garrett Reppenhagen. Also participating will be Bobby Muller, founder of Vietnam Veterans of America and of Veterans for America, a new program dedicated to meeting the needs of a new generation of veterans. Wood's book, *What Was Asked of Us: An Oral History of the Iraq War by the Soldiers Who Fought It*, details the history of the Iraq war through the eyes of those who actually fought in it. Captain Powers spent over fourteen months in Iraq in both Baghdad and Najaf, patrolling neighborhoods and witnessing firsthand the devastating human cost of war. Reppenhagen served as an Army sniper scout in Baquba for a year in 2004, immediately after leaving Kosovo. For the first time in history, the 2000 U.S. Census found that more immigrants reside in the suburbs of metropolitan Chicago than in the city of Chicago itself. Immigration, which is not new to Chicago, is nevertheless changing the makeup of the suburban region. Many towns are facing challenges such as overcrowding in housing, restructuring of schools, issues with transportation, and lack of available jobs. Many of these communities have limited experience integrating immigrant groups, particularly in large numbers. However, immigrants are an important human asset to be embraced to ensure a successful and prosperous future for all residents. Kenneth Johnson, a professor at Loyola University, will present the demographic trends of our region and projections of what the future holds. Sylvia Puente, director of the Metropolitan Initiative at the Institute for Latino Studies at the University of Notre Dame, will speak about the Latino community in the region. Tara Malone from the *Daily*

Herald will moderate. Findings from both the University of Notre Dame's *State of Latino Chicago* report as well as The Chicago Council's recently released report on Mexican integration, *A Shared Future: The Economic Engagement of Greater Chicago and Its Mexican Community*, will be shared during the program.
